From the Pastor's Study

Lent is just around the corner!

One of our Lenten disciplines this year will be to study the latest joint document of the ELCA and the US Conference of Catholic Bishops. (See related article on the front page.) Entitled *Declaration on the Way: Church, Ministry, and Eucharist* [*Declaration*], the document is the result of ecumenical dialogues between Lutherans and Roman Catholics that have been ongoing since the Second Vatican Council in the early 1960s.

The *Declaration* is a milestone on the way to our two bodies achieving unity. It identifies 32 statements where Lutherans and Catholics have consensus regarding church, the Eucharist, and ministry. While holding up our agreements regarding these three topics, the *Declaration* also explores areas where we do not yet completely agree. As often as not, the areas where we disagree regarding these doctrines are termed "not church dividing." There is much good news in the *Declaration*!

One of the tasks that the *Declaration* sets forth is education – in seminaries and parishes. Both

Lutherans and Catholics carry misconceptions from the past, not only about each other but also about themselves. What this document does is help clarify what Lutherans and Catholics *actually* believe and teach regarding church, Eucharist, and ministry. You may be surprised!

Both Father Sutton and I look forward to the Wednesday Night Soup Suppers where we will take a look at those things about which we agree and those areas where we have yet to reach a consensus. Each of the four study sessions will be recorded for podcasting on the St. Paul web site, so if your schedule is such that you won't be able to join us in person, you can still participate in studying this groundbreaking *Declaration* as we make our way toward 2017 and the 500th anniversary of the reformation begun by Martin Luther in 1517. We look forward to your being a part of this marvelous journey either in person or through the web!

Children's Ministry Takes a Big Step

Dear St. Paul Families,

In response to our call to provide educational opportunities leading to spiritual growth and discipleship for our children at St. Paul, we are pleased and excited to share with you and your children a plan for Sunday Church School for every Sunday, February 14, to May 15, save Easter Sunday. We hope your family will participate as many Sundays as possible. We ask for your feedback, questions, and suggestions.

The following is the general schedule for each Sunday morning:

All children begin worship with their parents.

Following the Prayer of the Day and before the First Lesson, children are invited to come to the chancel steps for a Children's Sermon.

Following the Children's Sermon, children, age 3 and above, are led downstairs to the classroom by the teacher and helping parent



assigned to the Sunday. Parents are, of course, welcome to accompany their children, but are also welcome to remain in worship. Parents of younger children are also welcome to bring their little ones and remain in the classroom with them for learning activities.

Classroom activities include a Bible Story, music time, reinforcement learning activities that may include drama, crafts, games, and paper and pencil activities. Materials will be available at two learning levels, a set for children age 3 through 1st Grade and a set for children Grades 2 through 6.

Children are led upstairs by the teacher and helping parent during the Peace, reunited with parents, as the Liturgy of the Table begins.

We hope you will volunteer to be a part of the teacher rotation (one Sunday every 4 to 6 weeks) or the helping parent rotation (one Sunday every 8 to 10 weeks). All materials and supplies will be prepared and ready in the classroom each Sunday.

We look forward to helping our children to learn and grow. This is a new plan for Sunday Church School at St. Paul so we will fine tune and evaluate as we go along with special consideration to input from our families.

God's blessings on us all as we make disciples!

Pennsylvania Lutheran seminaries declare intent to form new school of theology

CHICAGO (ELCA) – In simultaneous meetings held on their respective campuses January 12-13, the boards of Gettysburg and Philadelphia Lutheran seminaries adopted identical resolutions calling for "the creation of a new school of theology and leadership formation."

Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg and Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia are two of eight seminaries of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA).

Both boards' resolutions stated their actions were taken "in the conviction that God and the church are calling us into a new venture of theological education, with a mission of preparing faithful Christian leaders for the church and the world." The boards' unanimous actions authorized the two schools' presidents and other officers to take all necessary steps required prior to their April 2016 board meetings that would launch the process of creating a unified Lutheran seminary.

"Changes in both society and the church call for new experiments in theological education," said the Rev. Jonathan P. Strandjord, program director for seminaries. "The move by Gettysburg and Philadelphia towards forming a new school opens the door to a wide range of very promising experiments."

Founded in 1826, Gettysburg seminary is the oldest Lutheran seminary in the Americas. Widely renowned for its role in the great Civil War battle at Gettysburg, the school on Seminary Ridge opened an award-winning Seminary Ridge Museum in 2013. Since its founding in 1864, Philadelphia likewise has played a pivotal role in American and Lutheran his-

tory. Beginning more than 40 years ago, Philadel-phia's outreach to ecumenical partners, particularly historic African American churches, has created one of the most diverse learning environments that exists in 21st century theological education.

"From the moment we both felt the Spirit leading in this bold new direction," said Presidents David Lose and Michael Cooper-White (of Philadelphia and Gettysburg respectively), "it became clear that our proposal would not envision simply blending together two fine traditions and excellent institutions. Rather, we believe God is calling us to do a new thing. Mergers are created out of past realities; our vision is to embrace what God is beckoning from the future."

"The heart of this plan," the two presidents continued, "is the opportunity to engage the larger church in a conversation about what the church needs from a seminary today and then build *that* kind of seminary, not simply try to adapt existing institutions to a world very different from the one in which they were initially launched. We believe a new seminary will be among the leading institutions of theological education and leadership formation."

The boards and administrative leaders also issued strong reassurances to current students at both schools that they will be able to complete their studies under current curricular requirements. Many students and recent graduates already have experienced enhanced offerings as the two schools have expanded faculty sharing and offered reciprocal registration and library privileges in recent years.
