As I write, it's the eve of Palm/Passion Sunday and the beginning of Holy Week. It's my most beloved week of the year and at the same time it come with some anxiety. The "Hosannas" of the Palm parade give way to "crucify." I know how significant it is to walk to the cross and stand at the foot and experience the grief of Christ's death, but it always hurts. I know all of these different services demand that I stay on top of where I am and what I'm doing, I know I will be exhausted by the close of the worship on Resurrection Sunday. Upcoming Budget and Stewardship

Sanctuary Opportunities

Carolyn Swenson plans to attend the "Guardian Angel" training being organized through the Rocky Mountain Synod later this month. This program of the ELCA was formed to accompany migrant children through the court system. The program will need to identify some "Welcoming Congregations" in the Denver metro area. She consulted with Ron Hoffman, and they agreed that this may be a great opportunity and fit with the steps we are taking to explore offering St. Paul as a sanctuary congregation.

She talked with the coordinator about our upcoming training on the 24th, and she said that it would be nice to have some Welcoming Congregations in place before we start going to court. That way we have some ELCA congregations to which we can refer people.

Welcoming Congregations commit to four things:

- 1. Welcome and minister to migrant guests and identify a contact person in the congregation who speaks enough Spanish for basic communication:
- 2. Attend occasional meetings of the Welcoming Congregations Network in your synod for mutual support, fellowship and training;

- 3. Participate in conference calls to be updated on the current situation of migration of children and families and receive policy updates; and
- 4. Advocate for public policy that will positively impact the current immigration crisis including working in partnership with the ELCA Washington Office and Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service on immigration reform.

Being a WC does not mean that everyone in the congregation is on board. It only requires the pastor to be willing and there to be a small team.

This will be presented to the Council in April and then opened to the congregation. Please share any feedback you have with any Council member, Pr Penni, Fr Don, Carolyn or Ron.

There will be no Congregation Meeting April 15, but we will have a Congregational Conversation after worship to bring everyone up to date on various activities/issues going on at St. Paul, so we hope you can be there.

Easter. It brings many emotions to the forefront of our minds all during one short week.

We began by celebrating Christ's triumphant return to Jerusalem on Passion Saturday or on Palm Sunday, when we gathered in the courtyard and processed into the Nave waving palms and singing joyously.

Then, on Maundy Thursday, at 7pm we're plunged into sadness when we recall the Last Supper, Jesus' betrayal by one of His friends, the time He spent in prayer and meditation alone in the Garden of Gethsemane while He struggled with the knowledge that He would soon die, and His arrest and trial at the hands of Pontius Pilate.

On Good Friday, we first observe the Stations of the Cross at noon and later, at 7pm we worship

together again remembering the suffering and death of Christ on the cross as He fulfilled the promise of dying so that we can all receive His forgiveness by grace.

Holy Saturday finds us together starting at 8pm to take part in the Easter Vigil, where we wait and hope for Christ's victory over death.

And then at 9:15 Easter morning, we'll begin by sharing a brunch to break the fast begun on Holy Saturday and continue the celebration at 10:30am with joyous Allelulias, greetings of "Happy Easter" and shouts of "He IS Risen! He IS Risen, Indeed!"

Please plan to join us for one or all of the worship opportunities of Holy Week and experience how this journey will touch you.

Council Highlights

March 13, 2018 Meeting

Pastor Penni's Report

- Lenten Soup Suppers are going well and having House for all Sinners and Saints join us for dinner has been good. Thanks to Irene, Lin, Diane and Maryann for organizing.
- Outside Ashes on Ash Wednesday with the evening service counted 77 people. There are more people joining us for weekend services and some interested in becoming members.
- St. Paul is no longer leading worship for the Opening Ceremony at Synod Assembly in May. We are waiting to see if Pastor Penni and Father Don will be able to have an opportunity to highlight our unique relationship.
- Jeff and Jeff will organize an Easter Brunch at 9:00 instead of a Potluck.
- The April 15 Congregational Meeting is postponed until June 24 to accommodate completion of the Constitution and By-laws. (See New Business)

Father Don's Report

- A pianist has been found for the Saturday Mass.
- Acceptance into the ECC is almost complete.
 On June 24, the Feast of Corpus Christi, there will be an induction service with many guests including ECC bishops.
- A Christian Seder will be held at Father Don's on Palm Sunday evening.

Treasurer's Report

- We have made great strides since last year in balancing the budget. We have \$164,800 in savings.
- Aaron will give presentations / discussions of the upcoming budget during Adult Forum on March 25, April 15, and May 13.

Old Business and Updates

 Rummage Sale May 18-19. Irene, Liz, Michelle, and Lin are in charge. We'll get hanging signs and Facebook notifications.

New Business

- Building Use Fee Schedule discussed and approved with changes. It was moved and seconded that we remove all fees except a \$50 Custodial Care Charge for Non-Profit Functions and say that Donations are accepted. These and the For-Profit Functions fees effective as of July 1, 2018.
- Constitution and Bylaws. Council's
 Consensus was to expedite the process
 so that the Catholic Community could file
 their own Constitution and By-laws as
 soon as possible. To allow more time, the
 Congregational Meeting will be moved from
 April 15 to June 24.

Stewardship Campaign begins on April 14 and 15. The theme is *Out of our Past and Into our Future*.

- April16 Mail / emails sent announcing Stewardship 2018 with an invitation to Consecration Weekend on May 5/6
- April 23 Council will call members of committees and all volunteers to get reservation commitments.

The Who's Tommy finds triumph amid trauma


