

# Join Us Often During Holy Week

HOLY WEEK BEGINS on April 14 with Palm Sunday Worship at 10:30. We'll gather in the courtyard (weather permitting) and be led into the church by the choir singing, waving palms and celebrating the triumphant return of Jesus to Jerusalem.

On Wednesday, April 17 a prayer vigil will be held in the Nave from 9 a.m. until 9 p.m. There will not be an organized service that day, but the Nave will be open to all who wish to take part.

Maundy Thursday, April 18, will be observed with worship at 7 p.m.

Good Friday Stations of the Cross begins at noon, and there will be a worship service at 7 p.m.

Easter Vigil will start at 8 p.m. on Saturday, April 20.

Easter Brunch is served from 9:30 to 10:15 a.m. on April 21, and at 10:30 a.m. our entire community will come together with shouts of 'Alleluia!' and 'He Is Risen Indeed!' in glorious celebration of Christ's triumph over death and rising from the grave.

New members will be welcomed during Easter Worship.

# Council Highlights from March 12, 2019

**Pastor Barbara's report:** She discussed a possibility of a Personnel Committee with chain of command. She will ask for similar documents from her previous church, and Aaron mentioned that he would combine what we already have in personnel matters, like a Policy and Procedures document, and that it be finished and presented to Council within three months.

• Synod Assembly in Albuquerque still needs a male voting member.

**Cancellation Procedures:** The pastor will decide if St. Paul is closed and will make sure that an announcement goes out via email.

**Father Don reported on Food Bridge:** Council decided to invite Marin Toscano's Food Bridge to use our kitchen for training immigrant chefs for a trial period of six months after entering into a written agreement. Greg and Jeff would review this agreement and make sure it is cost neutral.

**Worship:** There will be a follow-up meeting on Saturday, April 13 (the day before Palm Sunday) to discuss procedures for all who serve in the worship at St. Paul: ushers, sacristans, assisting ministers, crucifers, and clergy.

**Evangelism:** Irene is looking into postcard mailings before Easter to people in zip codes in

St. Paul's neighborhood. She is considering two companies; one from Arizona and one local.

**Fellowship:** Lenten Suppers and Coffee Hour are in order. Monthly birthday cakes (without names) are being considered. Seder Dinner plans are progressing. Lin and the team will work next month on the Parish Picnic.

Homeless and Hungry Task Force: Lori announced that the work was finished and presented their recommendations: The Community should support five ministries: Metro Caring, Project Angel Heart, Family Promise, Gaylord Street Reach, and Women's Homelessness Initiative. Support should include such tasks as creating a contact sheet for each organization, encouraging financial and in-kind contributions, encouraging individual volunteerism, including each agency in our 2019-2020 mission-based budget. A full report will be published in the St. Paul Newsletter.

# 'Sweat' Explores Fraying Bonds at the Factory

Our final show of the season is entitled **Sweat**. For the people of Reading, Pennsylvania, work is so much more than a paycheck – it is the glue that holds the town together. The floor of their central factory is



where lifelong friendships are made, where love blooms and where family members work side by side. But, as layoffs become the new norm and a cheaper workforce threatens the viability of the local union, the threads that once kept the community together begin to fray. Sweat powerfully contrasts life's happiest highs with the heart-wrenching struggles of survival. Using

warm humor and sympathy, this 2017 Pulitzer Prize winner from Lynn Nottage paints a moving portrait of today's working-class America in decline. We will see this play in the Space Theatre on May 14. Deadline for purchasing
