


#### Historic Moment

It's bigger than just us now.

Lutherans and Catholics have been acting as God's Church together at St. Paul for two decades. We share not just a building, but a community. We share clergy and finances.

On Wednesday, October 30, 2019, Catholic and Lutheran leaders took official notice of what we have been doing and urged others to do the same.

Bishop James Gonia of the ELCA's Rocky Mountain Synod and The Most. Rev. Francis Krebs, Presiding Bishop of the Ecumenical Catholic Communion, held a joint service at St. Paul to sign a historic statement of unity among Lutherans and Catholics.



While the accord stops just short of full communion, it encourages ELCA and ECC congregations to move ever closer to each other (see next page for the text). The two bishops expressed hope that a grassroots ecumenical movement will grow out of this moment and spread far and wide.

How blessed are we at St. Paul to be doing the work of unifying God's church.

## Considerations for Collaboration in Mission and Sharing in Worship between Congregations of the Rocky Mountain Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and Congregations of the Ecumenical Catholic Communion in this Territory

Over many years, a number of congregations from our two churches in this Rocky Mountain territory have developed important relationships in their local settings. These relationships rest on strong affinities in mission, including substantial proximity on many issues of our time, and thus enrich the witness of these communities to the world. Members of these communities also desire to share together as much as possible in worship.

These Considerations seek both to celebrate and to provide guidance for these relationships.

#### **General Principles**

The ELCA's 1991 Policy Statement, "A Declaration of Ecumenical Commitment,"1 articulates principles helpful for these Considerations:

- "Ecumenism has as its focus and goal clarity of understanding among Christians and a greater realization of unity among Christ's people."
- "Local ecumenism, and its synodical and regional forms, provides a rich area of progress and challenge for the unity of the church. It has much to teach and much to learn from the national and international ecumenical movement."
- Ecumenical collaboration in many forms, including through the National Council of Churches to which both national church bodies belong, can be an important step toward deeper relationship.

#### **Particular Guidelines for Worship**

 Especially when sharing the same facilities, ECC and ELCA congregations are

- encouraged to pray together, to study the Scriptures, and to gather together for special occasions of the church year. In particular, they can make a practice of presence at one another's baptismal celebrations and on occasions like the installation of a new pastor.
- Both the ELCA and the ECC practice eucharistic hospitality, welcoming all baptized persons to the eucharistic table. Therefore, ELCA Lutherans are welcomed to participate in ECC Eucharists, making "conscientious decisions" about receiving the sacrament,2 as ECC members do at Lutheran celebrations.
- Both churches allow for clergy from other traditions to preach in worship, including at celebrations of the Eucharist or Lord's Supper. Therefore, ECC clergy are welcome to preach in ELCA congregations when invited to do so by the local congregation and vice versa.
- Both churches provide for lay persons to assist in certain roles in their own and in other Eucharists, e.g., as lectors, eucharistic ministers, etc. Therefore, lay members present at a liturgy of the other community are welcome to assume roles which the hosting community deems to be lay roles.

Since our two churches are not in full communion with each other, it is not permitted for ECC clergy to preside at an ELCA liturgy or vice versa, or for ministers from the two churches to co-preside at a Eucharist. Nor are they to administer other sacraments or ecclesial rites.

Exceptions may be made only by joint agreement of the local ELCA and ECC bishops and only in cases of genuine pastoral need.

Vice President of Development at Project Angel Heart, thanking all of us at St. Paul for our generosity and explaining that the cereal donations make it possible for Coloradans who are living with cancer, HIV/AIDS, kidney/heart disease, or other serious illness to get the extra nutrition they need without expending precious energy to do food prep. Lackey said that 'your generosity ensures that over 3,000 Coloradans with life-threatening illness receive the nutrition they need to keep fighting. Thank you for your support!'

If you're interested in learning about how you can help Project Angel Heart here's some more information and brief descriptions of what each volunteer position does. The contact information for Kamisha Jones, Volunteer Coordinator and Administrative Assistant is also included:

**Kitchen dish-up** on Mondays or Fridays from 1-4pm, must be able to volunteer twice a month: During the dish-up shift you and other volunteers assist the kitchen by portioning and packaging the daily meal. This process is assembly-line style. The interesting part of the dish-up process is that you get to see the slight variations in the recipe to accommodate the five different diets available to clients!

**Shuttle drivers,** Saturdays noon-1pm, volunteer once a month or more: For those of you that don't have a lot of extra time but want to still volunteer, being a shuttle driver is a flexible and quick opportunity! Satellite shuttle drivers come to Project Angel Heart's facility to pack up meals in their own large vehicles (vans, SUVS, and trucks) and deliver those meals to a designated satellite

location near their home.

#### **Friday meal**

**delivery,** Fridays 10:30-1pm, volunteer once a month or more: Deliver alone or with a friend or family! Delivery drivers pick-up meal bags from Project Angel Heart (4950 Washington St, Denver) and use their own vehicles to deliver nutritious meals to clients living within a 5-mile radius of the facility. Each volunteer is given a route with an average of 10 clients and delivery locations.

**Saturday meal delivery,** Saturdays 12:30-3pm, volunteer once a month or more: Deliver alone or with a friend or family! Delivery drivers pick-up meal bags from one of several satellite locations and use their own vehicles to deliver nutritious meals to clients living near the satellite locations. Each volunteer is given a route with an average of 10 clients and delivery locations.

To get started, please email us back with your name and which of the upcoming Saturday morning orientations you can attend. If you cannot make an orientation, email us back with your name and the above volunteer position you are interested in and we can schedule another time to meet.
